

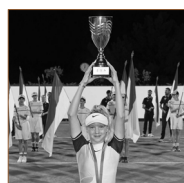
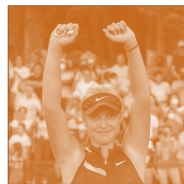

EDITORIAL

Many of us saw 2022 as a year of hope after recovering from the brunt of the pandemic. Unfortunately, 2022 was particularly affected by the outbreak of a new conflict on the doorstep of the European Union and the intensification of geopolitical and economic tensions globally. As this annual report is being published at the beginning of June 2023, the period we are facing is proving to be a particularly troubled one.

In the face of these upheavals, engaging philanthropically is nevertheless a source of hope, and it is against this backdrop that I write these lines and salute the generous support of our donors. Our young players have returned the favor by dazzling the world with their talent.

Whether it be Stefanos Tsitsipas, Coco Gauff, Holger Rune, Lorenzo Musetti or others, the success of our alumni makes us proud and strengthens our determination to pursue our commitment to helping our young talents build their tennis careers.

As in previous years, 2022 was a very successful year. For the girls, our highlights include an Orange Bowl Singles Finalist and a Junior Grand Slam Doubles title at the Australian Open. For the boys, our players were Singles Winners and Finalists at *Les Petits As* and Doubles Winners. We are delighted with the dazzling progress all of our players have achieved.

Since its creation in October 2014, under the aegis of Fondation de Luxembourg, Champ'seed Foundation has already enabled 40 youngsters, aged 10 to 21, to be awarded grants to cover their sports training and education, their physical preparation, their medical expenses, and their costs related to the use of sports facilities and equipment. Champ'seed Foundation also allocated grants to cover their travel costs for their attendance to practice and tournaments as well as to help these youngsters prepare their entry in the professional world, on and off a tennis court. These young talents were able to benefit from the expertise of Champ'seed Foundation collaborators and the facilities of the Mouratoglou Academy which are made available to them, free of charge.

This report is the opportunity to thank all the donors and partners of Champ'seed Foundation for their generosity and their support which enable our players to build their outstanding future as athletes. This chance for a professional career, the children also owe it to the commitment of the technical training staff, the caregivers and the volunteers implicated on the board and in our group of experts. May they all be warmly thanked for their investment in this project.

As we look toward the future, we are committed to carrying out our action in line with the human and sporting values of the great family that is Champ'seed.

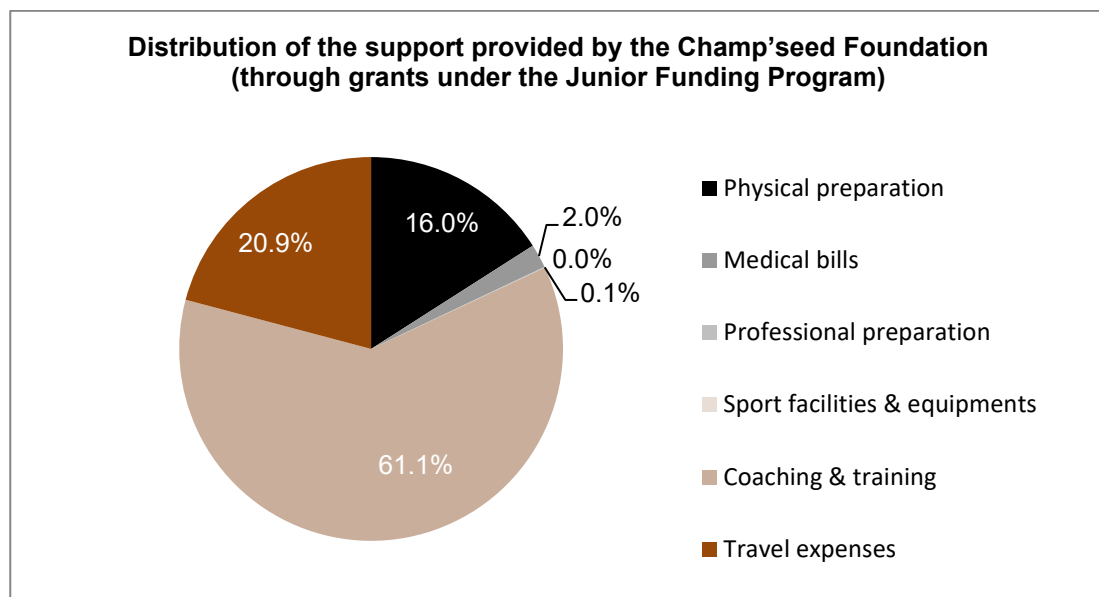
2. Support provided by the Champ'seed Foundation

Champ'Seed has for mission to select the most promising youths who don't have the needed resources and to empower them to achieve their potential in the sport they have chosen to compete in professionally.

With the support of 13 youths in 2022 as part of the charitable Junior Funding Program, Champ'seed Foundation continued to pursue the objectives of its mission statement:

- Seek to build sustainable relationships with the players thanks to our donors' support
- Make the average level progress for all the players eligible for grants provided by the foundation
- Take part in major international tournaments and win titles at the highest level worldwide.

The players were able to count on the assistance of the Champ'seed Foundation to finance a coach, a fitness trainer, medical monitoring, contribute towards travel expenses (accommodation, train and plane tickets, meals) in order to attend international competitions. These expenses are often doubled for these youths as they cannot travel alone.



3. Schooling and sports education

Education is crucial for all youngsters, that they be gifted tennis players or not. Champ'seed Foundation seeks to encourage all players to actively pursue their academic education.

Champ'seed Foundation's commitment is specifically limited to the promotion in the public interest of the education of youngsters in need through tennis in any way the Board might find useful, including by:

- The attribution of grants to these youths based on capabilities to finance their practice, physical preparation, medical expenses and the use of necessary facilities and equipment for their education and training;
- The allocation of grants to cover travel expenses linked to the pursuit of such an education;
- The assistance and preparation of these youngsters to enter the professional world, on and off the courts.

The importance of a continuing education is recognized by the adapted schooling program, that the studies be pursued in a public or private school or through distance learning.

Champ'seed Foundation also has a relationship with the Mouratoglou Academy which offers students a high-level sports and academic curriculum enabling to best combine intense training, tournaments, and academic programs throughout the year. The ultimate goal is to guarantee to students a proper life project around sports and education leading to the professional circuit or an American university program with a focus on sports.

Champ'seed Foundation supports all players in the same way, that they study at the Mouratoglou Academy or follow another school education system.

II. 2022 HIGHLIGHTS

1. 2022 Pro-AM & Champ'seed Gala

After being cancelled in 2020 because of the Covid-19 pandemic, and held in 2021 as a small-scale event, the traditional annual charity gala made a grand return on the weekend of June 18th and 19th, 2022.

The gala brought together donors, young talents and former tour professionals in two frenzied pro-amateur tournaments.



All the participants then traded their tennis gear for elegant evening attire to enjoy a traditional charity gala dinner that took place around the tennis-racket shaped swimming pool of the Mouratoglou Resort Hotel****.



One of the evening's highlights, was the fundraising auction organized by the Champ'seed Foundation, the profits of which were donated to the Junior Funding Program to support our current and future young talents. Guests were able to win precious and legendary prizes, including original tennis rackets belonging to Serena Williams and Stefanos Tsitsipas, boxing gloves signed by Mike Tyson and an hour on the tennis court playing against Foundation alumni Holger Rune and Coco Gauff. The event also saw the naming of the Mouratoglou Academy's Center Court put up for auction.

One thing is for sure, our masters of ceremonies Zuri Hall and Josh Cohen were able to form an amazingly entertaining duo throughout the evening before giving up the dance floor to mythical Bob Sinclar.

2. Weeks of training and selection

The periods of training for the players selected by Champ'seed Foundation stretch out throughout the year. As regards their respective programs, these young talents come to adjust their game and get advice from Patrick Mouratoglou and the rest of the team.

In addition to regular training periods, a major gathering took place in 2022 to scout new talent. It is under the expert eye of Patrick Mouratoglou and Sandra Zaniewska, the technical coordinator, that some of these talents were invited to become members of the Champ'seed Foundation.

3. Champ'seed Foundation's sporting successes in 2022

Elsa Jacquemot (France) was invited to join the Champ'seed Foundation in early 2022. She ended the year with her first professional tour title at the ITF \$100K Dubai tournament in the United Arab Emirates and moved up 128 places in the WTA rankings in 2022, to 144th at the end of the year.



The “**Fruhvirtova Super Sisters**” (Czech Republic) continued to exceed all expectations.



The eldest sister, **Linda Fruhvirtova**, continued her rise to the top, moving up 200 places to World 79th player in the WTA rankings at the end of the year, aged just 17.

She won her first WTA 250 tournament in Chennai, India. She also won her third ITF title at the ITF \$25K tournament in Cancun, Mexico.

Younger sister **Brenda Fruhvirtova** also made spectacular progress. She won no less than 8 ITF \$25K tournaments in 2022. With an 85% win-loss ratio on the professional tour in 2022, she is now No.132 in the WTA rankings at just 15 years of age, moving up a whopping 961 places.





Clervie Ngounoue (United States) won Australian Open girls' Doubles event with Diana Shnaider.

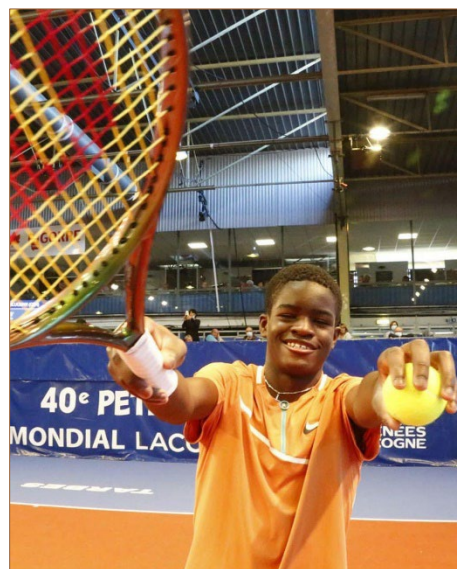
Later in the year, she won an ITF Junior JA in Merida, Mexico, and was the Finalist in the prestigious Orange Bowl in the United States.

Her consistency enabled her to finish the year ranked No. 8 in the ITF Junior World Rankings, having gained 4 places in 2022.

Carel Ngounoue (USA), the younger brother of the 'Ngounoue Super Sibling' duo, was invited to join the Champ'seed Foundation in September 2022.

He was scouted at U14 level, reaching the *Les Petits As* Final in the singles event and winning the doubles competition.

In the Under 18s, he made a name for himself by winning an ITF Junior J4 singles tournament in Accra, Ghana, and two ITF Junior J5 tournaments in Veracruz (Mexico), and Douala (Cameroon).



Thijs Boogaard (Netherlands) continued to impress.

At the start of 2022 in the Under 14s, he won *Les Petits As* Singles and Doubles trophies, as well as the Tennis Europe 2022 Champion title, both in the singles and doubles events.

He then set about progressing in the under-18 category. In Canada, at the end of 2022 and beginning of 2023, he won six titles in a row in ITF Junior tournaments, setting a record of 37 consecutive match victories.





Ksenia Efremova (Russia) confirmed that she is the new face of tomorrow's tennis. Winner of the Tennis Europe Junior Masters U14 in Monte Carlo, she is ranked No.2 in the European U14 rankings.

This year she won her first ITF Junior under-18 tournaments, becoming at 13 years and 9 days old the youngest player in the history of tennis since Emma Raducanu in 2015 to win these tournaments in which the minimum age is 13.

Her win/loss ratio, all age categories combined, was 90% in 2022.

Svit Suljić (Slovenia) ended 2022 at No.18 in the European U14 rankings, having won the Category 3 U14 tournament in Bad Waltersdorf, Austria.

Progressing for the first time at under-18 level, he won the ITF Junior tournament in Jeddah, Saudi Arabia, at just 14, in both the singles and doubles tournaments.



The highly promising **Maël Gérinié** (New Caledonia, France) joined the Champ'seed family in 2022.

He is one of the most gifted players in his age category worldwide.

Let's hope that 2023 will be even more successful!

4. Spotlight on the Champ'seed Foundation Alumni

At the end of 2017, thanks to his excellent results, **Stefanos Tsitsipas** (Greece) was able to finance his own way and thus left the Champ'seed Foundation at the age of 19. Since then, Stefanos has continued to progress at the highest level. He won the Next Gen Masters in 2018, and the following year won the ATP World Tour Finals, which features the world top eight players.



At the Grand Slam, he reached the semi-finals three times at the Australian Open, in 2019, 2021 and 2022; and the final in 2023; at Roland Garros, he reached the semi-finals in 2020 and the final in 2021, finishing the year ranked World No.3.

At the time of writing this report, Stefanos is ranked No.5 in the world.



Early bloomer **Cori "Coco" Gauff** (USA) left the foundation in 2018 at the age of 14 after securing a major sponsorship deal. She then went on to achieve remarkable success and won her first title on the professional circuit in Linz (Austria) in 2019. To date, she has three singles titles and eight women's doubles titles on the WTA Tour.

She reached the round of 16 at Wimbledon in 2019 and at the Australian Open in 2020.

In 2021, she reached a Grand Slam final for the first time in doubles at the US Open.

In 2022, she reached the singles final at the French Open and the quarterfinals at the US

Open. Her excellent results in 2022 gave her WTA career-high ranking of 4th world singles player and 1st world doubles player.

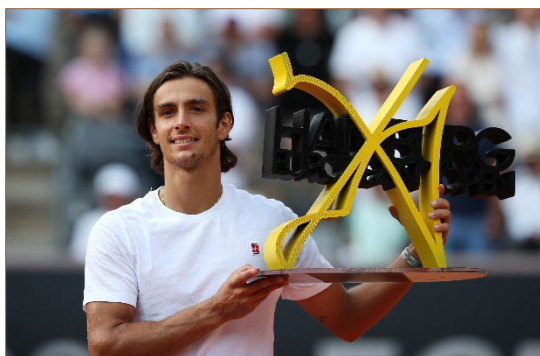
She is currently ranked world 7th in the women's singles and world 4th in the women's doubles in WTA rankings.

2022 ANNUAL ACTIVITY REPORT

Alexei Popyrin (Australia) was supported by the Champ'seed Foundation until the end of 2018, as he was fast approaching the Top 100 players in the world. In 2021 he won his first ATP 250 tournament in Singapore and reached his highest ranking to date at World No.59.

In 2022, he won the ATP Challenger in Bordeaux.

There is no doubt that we will continue hearing from this great player's success!



Comfortably established in the world's Top 100 and therefore now able to finance himself, **Lorenzo Musetti** (Italy) left the foundation at the beginning of 2021. He then recorded his first win against a Top 10 player, Diego Schwartzman (ranked World No.9) in 2021, and repeated the feat in 2022 against Felix Auger-Aliassime (ranked World No.9).

In 2022, he won his first two ATP Tour titles

at the ATP 500 tournament in Hamburg (Germany), and the ATP 250 tournament in Naples (Italy).

To date, he is at his career-high ranking of World 17th.

Well established in the ATP Top 100, **Holger Rune** (Denmark) left the Champ'seed Foundation when he turned 18 at the start of 2022. Since then, he has gone from strength to strength.

He reached the Top 50 after his first title on the ATP circuit in Munich, Germany. At Roland Garros, he reached his first Grand Slam quarter-final and won the title in Stockholm (Sweden). Just two weeks later, he won the Paris Master's trophy - his biggest career victory to date.



He is currently at his career-high ranking of World 6th.

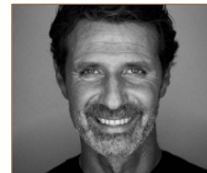

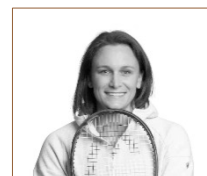

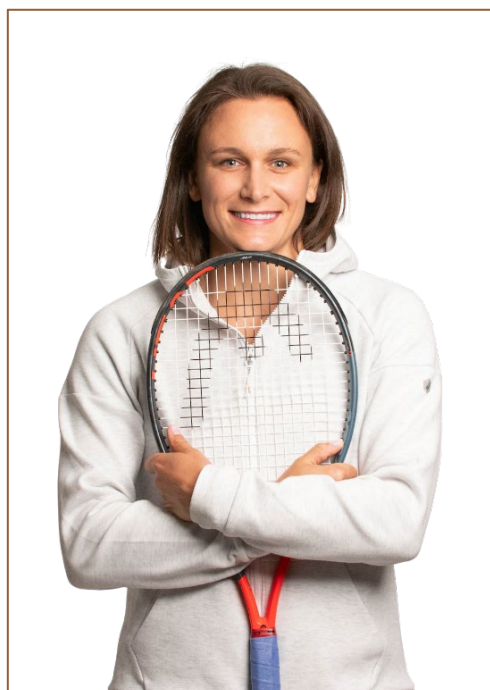

Sandra Zaniewska has been Technical Coordinator for the Champ'seed Foundation since April 2021.



Born on 3 January 1992, Sandra is a Polish tennis coach and former professional player. At her highest level, she reached 142nd in the WTA rankings, before ending her playing career prematurely after multiple injuries. Sandra then started a new career as a high-level coaching expert. She led Petra Martić to her highest ranking in 2020 (WTA #14), and more recently she coached Alizé Cornet.

Sandra enjoys developing relationships and working on the courts with the players' individual coaches.

In her role, Sandra is responsible for identifying candidates eligible for support from Champ'seed Foundation and passing the applications on to the expert panel for review and validation.

1. New week of training and selection

New training and selection weeks should take place in 2023 to support new promising tennis talents that don't have the necessary financial resources to reach their highest potential.

They will give the opportunity to the best juniors to show off the extent of their talent to Patrick Mouratoglou, President and Founder of the Champ'seed Foundation, Sandra Zaniewska, the Technical Coordinator, and an *ad hoc* team of coaches from the Mouratoglou Academy.

Many celebrities but also business owners and other high-level athletes are expected to attend to support the foundation.

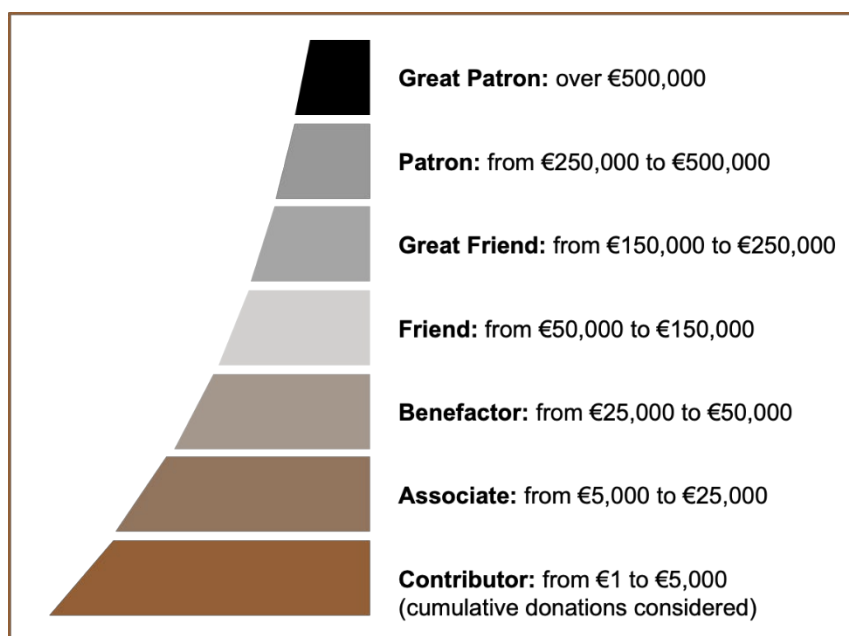
