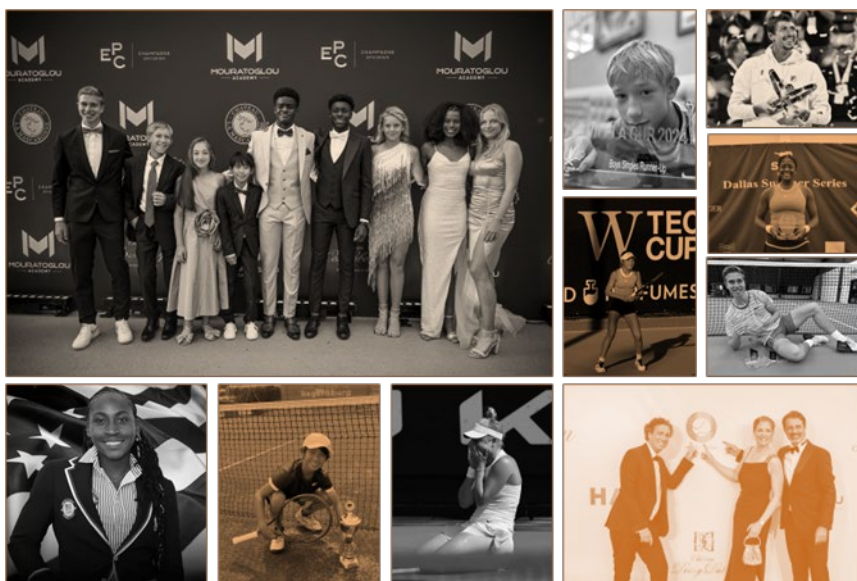

EDITORIAL

At the time of writing, our alumna Cori 'Coco' Gauff has just triumphed at the 2025 Roland Garros French Open. This is her second Grand Slam title, following her victory at the US Open in 2023. This achievement fills us with pride and once again demonstrates the tremendous potential of our young athletes.

And speaking of young talent, the next generation is already here: Our Champ'seeds are growing strong this season! Victoria Barros and Thijs Boogaard made a remarkable entry into the world's Top 25 Junior rankings. Clervie Ngounoue is now ranked World Number 231, on the cusp of direct qualification for all Grand Slam tournaments. Elizaveta Anikina and Nikita Berdin are among the Top 20 in the Tennis Europe rankings for under-14s.

So many reasons to be proud for the Champ'seed Foundation, which will be celebrating its 11th anniversary in a few weeks!

Our unwavering commitment to training young talents resulted in no fewer than 23 titles won on the junior and professional circuits in 2024. Elizaveta Anikina, our Estonian prodigy, won seven of these titles on her own. Her victory at the prestigious Auray tournament (U12) was a moment to remember, as was her beaming grin. The same tournament saw our young Japanese champion Reita Yamanaka shine as a remarkable finalist.

Carel Ngounoue entered the World's Top 100 Juniors, but an injury then slowed his progress. His sister Clervie won her very first professional title on her home turf in Naples, Florida, before going on to win two more. Ksenia Efremova, who is just 14 years old, continues to make her mark on the professional circuit. She won two additional titles this year since her first victory in 2023. As for Brenda Fruhvirtova, she reached a major milestone by winning her first Grand Slam match at the Australian Open — a shining example of how our foundation acts as a springboard to bring players to the highest level.

In 2024, two of our alumni also shone on the Olympic stage: Coco Gauff had the great honor of being named the United States' flag bearer at the opening ceremony. Meanwhile, Lorenzo Musetti took the podium to accept the bronze medal, bringing great excitement to his country and additional pride to our foundation.

The Champ'seed family also expanded with the arrival of a promising new talent: Moïse Kouame (FRA, born in 2009), winner of the prestigious Orange Bowl at the end of the year.

Since its inception in October 2014 under the aegis of Fondation de Luxembourg, the Champ'seed Foundation has supported 47 young individuals, aged 10 to 21, by awarding them grants to cover their training, physical preparation, medical expenses, equipment, and access to sports facilities. It also helped fund their travel expenses for competitions and training, and prepared them to enter the professional world, both on and off the court. All these young talents benefited from the expertise of the Champ'seed Foundation teams and free access to the facilities of the Mouratoglou Academy.

■ **Brenda Fruhvirtova (Czech Republic)**

Born in 2007

All-time career best rankings: No. 3 ITF Junior, No. 87 WTA

End 2024: No. 178 WTA (67 places lost in 2024)

2024: First Grand Slam title at the Australian Open

2023: 5th youngest player in the history of tennis to qualify for the main draw of the Australian Open Ladies' Singles, and the youngest player since Amélie Mauresmo to qualify for the main draw of the Roland Garros Ladies' Singles. The youngest player in the history of tennis to win 15 ITF singles titles at the age of 16

2022: Winner of 6 W25 and 2 W35 tournaments

2021: Winner of 1 ITF Junior JA tournament, 3 ITF Junior J1 tournaments, 1 ITF Junior J2 tournament, and Winner of the Junior Billie Jean King Cup, representing her country in team competition (as the youngest player in the tournament)

2020: Winner of *Les Petits As* U14 Singles

2019: Winner of *Les Petits As* U14 Doubles, the Tennis Europe Stockholm U14 SuperCat tournament, and Semi-Finalist in the Eddie Herr U16

2018: Winner of the Eddie Herr U14 and the Auray Super Open for U12s

■ **Thijs Boogaard (Netherlands)**

Born in 2008

All-time career best rankings: No. 17 ITF Junior, and No. 1,663 ATP

End 2024: No. 50 ITF Junior (4 places lost in 2024), and No. 1,725 ATP (51 places lost in 2024) – his progress was hampered by contracting mononucleosis

2024: Winner of 4 ITF Junior tournaments: 2 ITF Junior J200 tournaments in Norway (Oslo) and Germany (Villingen-Schwenningen) and 2 ITF Junior J100 tournaments in Norway (two-time champion in Stavanger)

2023: Back-to-back winner of 6 ITF Junior tournaments in Canada. Record of 37 consecutive match wins. The youngest player in the history of tennis to win an ITF Junior J300 tournament. First ATP point at the ITF \$15K tournament in Alkmaar, Netherlands

2022: Winner of *Les Petits As* U14 Singles and Doubles, Winner of Tennis Europe U14 Singles and Doubles

2021: Winner of two U14 Cat2 tournaments in Maribor (Slovenia)

■ **Carel Ngounoue (United States)**

Born in 2008

All-time career best ranking: No. 98 ITF Junior

End 2024: No. 404 ITF Junior (down 198 places in 2024 due to injury)

2024: Finalist in an ITF Junior J200 tournament in Lithuania (Siauliai), which saw him enter the world's Top 100 Juniors – before an injury slowed his progress.

2023: Semi-finalist of 1 ITF Junior J200 tournament, 1 ITF Junior J100 tournament and 1 ITF Junior J60 tournament

2022: *Les Petits As* U14s Singles Finalist and Doubles Winner. Singles Winner of 1 ITF Junior J4 tournament in Accra (Ghana) and 2 ITF Junior J5 tournaments in Veracruz (Mexico) and Douala (Cameroon); Doubles Winner of 1 ITF Junior J4 tournament in Lome (Togo) and 2 ITF Junior J5 tournaments in Douala (Cameroon);

■ **Ksenia Efremova (Russia, France by naturalization in 2023)**

Born in 2009

All-time career best rankings: No. 24 ITF Junior, No. 618 WTA

End 2024: Reached No. 44 ITF Junior (moved up 84 places in 2024) and No. 759 WTA (gained 246 spots in 2024).

2024: Australian Open quarter finalist. Semi-finalist at the Orange Bowl. Winner of two additional W15 tournaments in Monastir (Tunisia)

2023: Winner of the TIM Essonne U14 Cat 1 tournament, and 2 U14 Super Category tournaments. No. 1 in the European under 14s ranking. Winner of 2 ITF Junior J100 tournaments. Winner of 1 W15 tournament in Monastir, Tunisia - earning her first WTA point. The youngest player in 20 years to win an ITF adult tournament, at the age of 14 years, 4 months and 6 days.

2022: Winner of the Tennis Europe Junior Masters U14 in Monte Carlo (Monaco), she was ranked No.2 in the European U14 rankings. She won her first 4 ITF Junior under-18 tournaments, becoming at 13 years and 9 days old the youngest player in the history of tennis since Emma Raducanu in 2015 to win these tournaments in which the minimum age is 13. Her win/loss ratio, all age categories combined, was 90%.

2021: Winner of 1 U14 Cat2 tournament and 2 U14 Cat3 tournaments

2019: Winner of the Smrikva Bowl

■ **Victoria Barros (Brazil)**

Born in 2009

All-time career best ranking: No. 25 ITF Junior, No. 1090 WTA

End 2024: No. 53 ITF Junior (moved up 182 places in 2024), and No. 1115 WTA - her first WTA ranking

2024: Finalist in two J300 tournaments in Peru (Lima) and Germany (Bamberg), which helped her climb the rankings. Semi-finalist of 1 W15 tournament in Monastir, Tunisia - earning her first WTA points.

2023: Participated in ITF Junior U18 tournaments at the young age of 13. Winner of 2 Junior J30 ITF tournaments, 1 ITF Junior J60 tournament and 1 ITF Junior J100 tournament.

■ **Moïse Kouame (France)**

Born in 2009

All-time career best ranking: No. 14 ITF Junior, No. 834 ATP

End 2024: No. 36 ITF Junior (moved up 215 places in 2024), and No. 1597 ATP - his first ATP ranking

Joined the foundation in February 2024 at the age of 14.

2024: Finalist in the Orange Bowl (J500), Finalist in one J200 tournament in Japan (Miki City), Winner of one J100 tournament in India (Chandigarh), Finalist in the U16 European Team Championship 'Winter Cup Cadets' tournament

■ **Maël Gérinié (New Caledonia, France)**

Born in 2011

Joined the foundation in 2022 at the age of 10, leaving his native New Caledonia for the South of France to pursue his tennis career.

2023: Quarterfinalist in 1 U12 Cat 2 Junior International tournament in Wrexham, UK. Winner of 2 Under-14 tournaments at TC Vespins and TC Tignet, France.

■ **Nikita Berdin (Russia)**

Born in 2011

One of the most gifted worldwide in his age category.

Joined the foundation in December 2023 at the age of 12.

2024: Winner of 1 TE U14 Cat 1 tournament in Spain (Barcelona), 1 TE U14 Cat 2 tournament in Montenegro (Ulcinj), and 1 TE U14 Cat 3 tournament in Sweden (Vanersborg)

2023: Taking part in U14 tournaments at just 12 years old. Winner of 2 TE U14 Cat3 tournaments in Turkey; Winner of 1 TE U12 Cat1 tournament in Karlsruhe, Germany; 3 wins against players ranked Top 100 in the Tennis Europe rankings, 2 wins against players ranked Top 10 born in 2010.

■ **Elizaveta Anikina (Estonia)**

Born in 2012

One of the most gifted players worldwide in her age category

Joined the foundation in December 2023 at the age of 11

2024: Winner of two TE U14 Cat 2 tournaments in Estonia (Tallinn) and Latvia (Jurmala). Winner of four TE U12 Cat 1 tournaments in France (Open Super 12 Auray, Passage Espoir, Tennis Club de Boulogne-Billancourt and Villeneuve-Loubet). Winner of the TE U12 Super Category tournament at the Rafael Nadal Academy by Movistar in Mallorca, Spain.

2023: Player ranked No. 1 in Estonia in the under-12s; Winner of the Estonian Nationals in the under-12s and under-14s; Winner of 1 U12 Cat1 tournament in Furstenfeld, Austria, and 1 U14 Cat3 tournament in Tallinn, Estonia.

■ **Reita Yamanaka (Japan)**

Born in 2012

One of the most gifted worldwide in his age category

Joined the foundation in January 2023 at the age of 10

2024: Finalist in the Open Super 12 Auray (TE U12 Cat 1). Winner of 3 TE U12 Cat 1 tournaments: 1 tournament in Austria (Furstenfeld) and 2 tournaments in Germany (Karlsruhe and Regensburg)

2023: Taking part in U12 tournaments at just 10 years old. Winner of 2 TE U14 Cat3 tournaments in Turkey; Winner of 1 USTA L5 U12 tournament in Miami, and finalist in 2 TE U12 Cat2 tournaments in the Netherlands (Bergeijk and Amsterdam)

All these players get the support of the Champ'seed Foundation. Without the contribution from the foundation to their human and athletic fulfilment, they would have never had the opportunity to reach such a level of excellence.

2. Support provided by the Champ'seed Foundation

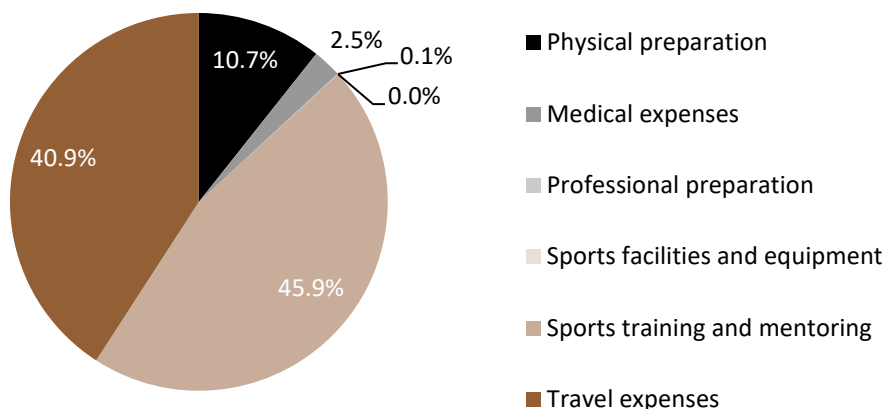
Champ'seed has for mission to select the most promising youths who don't have the needed resources and to empower them to achieve their potential in the sport they have chosen to compete in professionally.

With the support of 12 youths in 2024 as part of the charitable Junior Funding Program, Champ'seed Foundation continued to pursue the objectives of its mission statement:

- Seek to build sustainable relationships with the players thanks to our donors' support
- Make the average level progress for all the players eligible for grants provided by the foundation
- Take part in major international tournaments and win titles at the highest level worldwide.

The players were able to count on the assistance of the Champ'seed Foundation to finance a coach, a fitness trainer, medical monitoring, contribute towards travel expenses (accommodation, train and plane tickets, meals) in order to attend international competitions. These expenses are often doubled for these youths as they cannot travel alone.

3. Schooling and sports education

Education is crucial for all youngsters, that they be gifted tennis players or not. Champ'seed Foundation seeks to encourage all players to actively pursue their academic education.

Champ'seed Foundation's commitment is specifically limited to the promotion in the public interest of the education of youngsters in need through tennis in any way the Board might find useful, including by:

- The attribution of grants to these youths based on capabilities to finance their practice, physical preparation, medical expenses and the use of necessary facilities and equipment for their education and training;
- The allocation of grants to cover travel expenses linked to the pursuit of such an education;
- The assistance and preparation of these youngsters to enter the professional world, on and off the courts.

The importance of a continuing education is recognized by the adapted schooling program, that the studies be pursued in a public or private school or through distance learning.

Champ'seed Foundation also has a relationship with the Mouratoglou Academy which offers students a high-level sports and academic curriculum enabling to best combine intense training, tournaments and academic programs throughout the year. The ultimate goal is to guarantee to students a proper life project around sports and education leading to the professional circuit or an American university program with a focus on sports.

Champ'seed Foundation supports all players in the same way that they study at the Mouratoglou Academy or follow another school education system.

II. 2024 HIGHLIGHTS

1. 2024 Pro-AM & Champ'seed Gala

On the weekend of June 22nd & 23rd, 2024, the tenth Champ'seed Foundation Charity Gala took place.

The event was a great success. It brought together donors, young talent and former tour professionals who fiercely competed in two frenzied pro-amateur tournaments.





All the participants then traded their tennis gear for elegant evening attire to enjoy a traditional charity gala dinner that took place around the tennis-racket shaped swimming pool of the Mouratoglou Resort Hotel****.



One of the evening's highlights, was the fundraising auction organized by the Champ'seed Foundation, the profits of which were donated to the Junior Funding Program to support our current and future young talents. Guests had the opportunity to win legendary prizes, including a VIP experience at the UTS, as well as Coco Gauff's racket, which she used to win the US Open in 2023. The event also saw the naming of the Mouratoglou Academy's Centre Court put up for auction.

One thing is for sure: our masters of ceremonies, Zuri Hall and Christina Macfarlane, formed an amazingly entertaining duo throughout the evening. They then gave up the dance floor to the legendary Bob Sinclar. Even the rain couldn't stop the party!



2. Weeks of training and selection

The periods of training for the players selected by Champ'seed Foundation stretch out throughout the year. As regards their respective programs, these young talents come to adjust their game and get advice from Patrick Mouratoglou and the rest of the team.

In addition to regular training periods, a major gathering took place in 2024 to scout new talent. Under the expert eye of Patrick Mouratoglou and Mathis di Maio, the technical coordinator, some of these talents were invited to become members of the Champ'seed Foundation.

3. Champ'seed Foundation's sporting successes in 2024

Elizaveta Anikina, our Estonian prodigy, secured seven junior singles titles, including the prestigious Auray tournament (U12).



The same tournament in Auray saw our young Japanese champion **Reita Yamanaka** shine as a remarkable finalist, before going on to win three titles in the Under-12 category.

Nikita Berdin, our young Russian talent continued to progress, winning three tournaments in the Under-14 category.



Ksenia Efremova, who is just 14 years old, continued to make her mark on the professional circuit. She won two additional titles this year since her first victory in 2023. As of September 2023, she has been playing under the French flag.

Thijs Boogaard, our Dutch champion in the making, has made a strong comeback after recovering from mononucleosis, winning four ITF Junior tournaments.

In 2024, the Champ'seed Family welcomed the arrival of a new promising talent **Moïse Kouame**, born in 2009, winner of the prestigious Orange Bowl at the end of the year.

Let's hope that 2025 will be even more successful!

4. Spotlight on the Champ'seed Foundation Alumni

At the end of 2017, thanks to his excellent results, **Stefanos Tsitsipas** (Greece) was able to finance his own way and thus left the Champ'seed Foundation at the age of 19. Since then, Stefanos has continued to progress at the highest level. He won the Next Gen Masters in 2018, and the following year won the ATP World Tour Finals, which features the world top eight players.

At the Grand Slams, he reached the semi-finals three times at the Australian Open, in 2019, 2021 and 2022; and the final in 2023; at Roland Garros, he reached the semi-finals in 2020 and the final in 2021.

During the 2023 season, he reached 3rd place in the world ATP rankings for the 3rd year running.

In 2024, he triumphed for the third time on the clay courts of Monaco in the Masters 1000.



Early bloomer **Cori "Coco" Gauff** (USA) left the foundation in 2018 at the age of 14 after securing a major sponsorship deal. She then went on to achieve remarkable success and won her first title on the professional circuit in Linz (Austria) in 2019.

She reached the round of 16 at Wimbledon in 2019 and at the Australian Open in 2020.

In 2021, she reached a Grand Slam final for the first time in doubles at the US Open.

In 2022, she reached the singles final at the French Open and the quarterfinals at the US Open.

Coco's breakthrough came in 2023 when she secured her first Grand Slam title on home soil by winning the US Open.

Since then, she's been shining bright. In 2024, she was selected as the flag bearer for the United States at the Paris Olympic Games. In November, she won the WTA Finals, the WTA professional circuit tournament that brings together the eight best tennis players of the year at the end of each season.

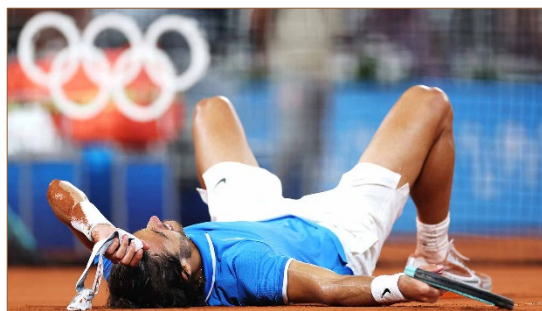
She is currently ranked No. 2 in the WTA rankings, marking her highest ranking to date. She very recently triumphed at Roland Garros, winning her second Grand Slam title.

Holger Rune (Denmark) left the Champ'seed Foundation when he turned 18 at the start of 2022. Since then, he has gone from strength to strength.

In 2022, Holger broke into the Top 100 of the ATP rankings for the first time in his career, later ascending to the Top 50 following his first ATP Tour title in Munich, Germany. At Roland Garros in the same year, he reached his first Grand Slam quarter-final and won the title in Stockholm (Sweden). Just two weeks later, he won the Masters 1000 trophy in Paris.



In 2023, he achieved a career-high ranking of World No. 4 after reaching the finals of two Masters 1000 tournaments in Rome and Monaco. In 2024, he reached the semi-finals of two Masters 1000 tournaments, in Paris and Cincinnati.



Comfortably established in the world's Top 100 and therefore now able to finance himself, **Lorenzo Musetti** (Italy) left the foundation at the beginning of 2021. He then recorded his first win against a Top 10 player, Diego Schwartzman (ranked World No.9) in 2021, and repeated the feat in 2022 against Felix Auger-Aliassime (ranked World No.9). In July 2022, he won his first ATP title in Hamburg, Germany.

In 2023, he reached the quarterfinals in Monte Carlo, the semi-finals in Barcelona and the round of 16 at Roland Garros.

2024 was a breakthrough year: he reached his first Grand Slam semi-final at Wimbledon, finished runner-up at Queen's, and took home the bronze medal at the Paris Olympics.

To date, Lorenzo is ranked 6th in the world in WTA rankings.

Alexei Popyrin (Australia) was supported by the Champ'seed Foundation until the end of 2018, as he was fast approaching the Top 100 players in the world. In 2021 he won his first ATP 250 tournament in Singapore. In 2023, he added another victory by winning the ATP 250 trophy in Umag, Croatia. In 2024, he won his first Masters 1000 in Montreal, Canada.

Alexei is currently ranked No. 21 in the WTA rankings — the highest position of his career so far.

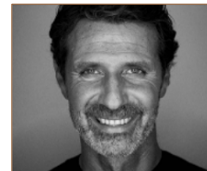

4. Technical coordination

Born on 23 November 1992, Mathis is a tennis coach and former top-level French tennis player.

He began playing tennis at the age of 12 and quickly rose through the ranks thanks to his tenacity, discipline, and love for the sport. He played in many national and international tournaments before retiring to devote himself to coaching.

Having joined at the Mouratoglou Academy since 2015, Mathis quickly gained Patrick Mouratoglou's trust and got involved with the Champ'seed Foundation as a coach from 2015. In recent years, he has helped and trained Champ'seed players such as Holger Rune, Jason Tseng, Lennon Jones, Linda and Brenda Fruhvirtova, Clervie Ngounoue and Michaela Laki. He has been Thijs Boogaard's consultant coach since 2021.

Mathis likes to get involved with the players and their individual coaches, both on and off the courts, to help them give their best.

In his role, Mathis is responsible for identifying candidates eligible for support from Champ'seed Foundation and passing the applications on to the expert panel for review and validation.

1. New week of training and selection

New training and selection weeks should take place in 2025 to support new promising tennis talents that don't have the necessary financial resources to reach their highest potential.

They will give the opportunity to the best juniors to show off the extent of their talent to Patrick Mouratoglou, President and Founder of the Champ'seed Foundation, Mathis di Maio, the Technical Coordinator, and an *ad hoc* team of coaches from the Mouratoglou Academy.

In addition to the Champ'seed Foundation's 11th anniversary, this will also be an opportunity to celebrate our alumna Coco Gauff's second Grand Slam title.

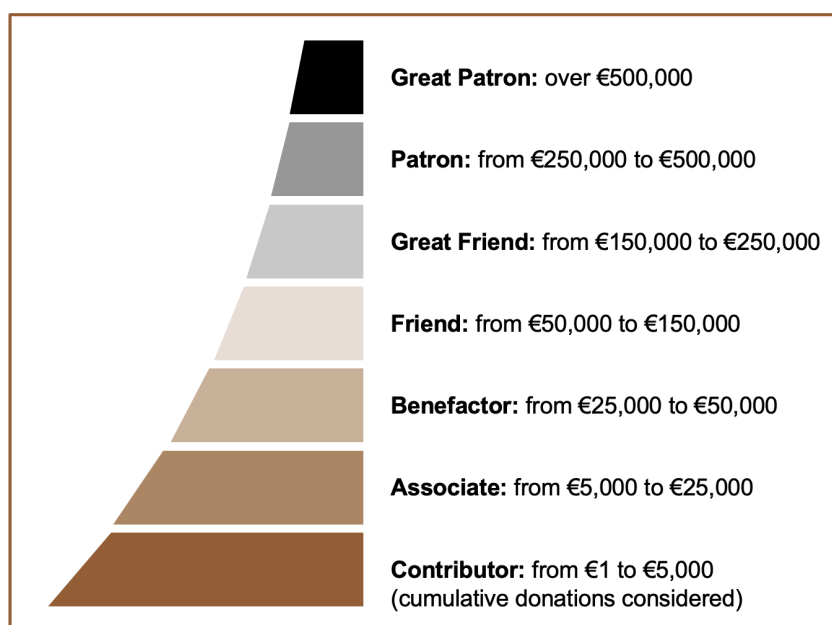
